


Resident Spotlight: Lincoln Card

Lincoln John Card was born February 12, 1926, in Cardston, Alberta, Canada on President Abraham Lincoln's birthday. He was the seventh of eight children.


As a boy, the cold, brisk southern Alberta wind was his companion as he waded through icy streams and climbed the Canadian Rockies. Each day was an adventure for him. He developed a great a love and appreciation for nature at an early age.

While attending high school, Lincoln enjoyed participating in student government and was a

member of the air and army cadets, a reserve group. He also spent the summers following his junior and senior years helping with the war effort by doing top secret research work at an experimental station in Suffield, Alberta, Canada.

In 1945, Lincoln left Canada to attend Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah. After two years at BYU, he accepted a mission call and served in the Australian Mission for 2 ½ years. During his mission he developed a great love

for children while teaching them in Primary. He felt strongly that he wanted to pursue a career working with children. After returning to BYU after his mission, he changed his major from chemistry to education.



After graduating from BYU in 1952, he married the love of his life, Jilene Peterson in the Salt Lake Temple. They have 4 children, 21 grandchildren and 33 great grandchildren.

Lincoln received a Master Degree from BYU in 1961 and an Associate Doctorate Degree from USU in 1979. During Lincoln's 37 years in

public service, he taught school in Canada and Utah and was a principal of four different elementary schools in Provo, Utah: Maesar, Grandview, Rock Canyon and Edgemont. He also served on a number of state education committees, directed the Basic Adult Education Program in Provo and was one of the pioneers in starting summer school activity programs in Provo School District. He served as the President of the State Elementary School

Principals Association. He also served as president of the Provo Library Board and was awarded life membership in the National PTA. In 1985, he was honored in Washington, D.C. by the Secretary of Education as the National Distinguished Principal from Utah. Through the years, he has earned the love and respect of thousands of students, teachers and parents.

After retiring, Lincoln enjoyed teaching two courses at BYU until he and Jilene were called to serve in the Texas Fort Worth Mission in 1988. Lincoln also served as a bishop of the Pleasant View 3rd Ward in Provo and in the Suncrest 2nd Ward in Orem as well as counselor in a branch presidency at the MTC in Provo. He served on various High Councils for thirteen years and in the baptistery and as an ordinance worker at the Mount Timpanogos Temple for ten years. He cherishes the friendships he made while working with and serving others in his various church callings.

Lincoln is a master gardener and taught his children the value of hard work. He also taught his children to love outdoor adventures. His children have many fond family memories finding Indian artifacts and arrowheads in southern Utah, searching for dinosaur bones and hiking to remote lakes in Canada, tenting in the high Uintah's or jumping in the car on Saturday's to go fishing or explore the many different canyons in Utah County.

Along with his love of the "great outdoors,"

Lincoln also enjoys poetry and literature. He calls poetry "the music of words." His children, grandchildren and great grandchildren cherish the poems and stories he has written and shared with them through the years.

Lincoln has patterned his life after the title of the song, "Have I Done Any Good in the World Today." He prays daily that he can find someone to serve through a smile, kind word or deed. Whether it is a stranger on the street, a family member, a friend, someone he worked with professionally, in the community or at church, all have felt of his kindness and love once they met him. His personal creed in life is: "Let your voice, your actions and your influence make the world a better place because you were there."

Lincoln claims that his greatest achievement in life was being married to his sweet heart, Jilene and working hand in hand with her to successfully raise four children.

Lincoln and Jilene moved into Summerfield Retirement Community in May, 2018. They appreciated the warm welcome they received. After Jilene's passing in October, 2018, Lincoln has cherished his ongoing friendship with all of you, his Summerfield family.
