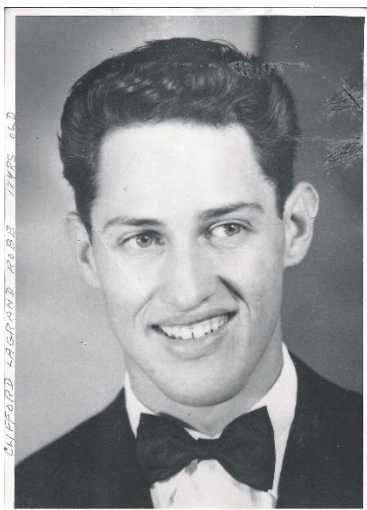

Clifford & Karilin Robb were married in the Salt Lake City temple on a very snowy 6th of December 1956. Clifford LaGrande was born February 2, 1936 in Cedar City, Utah to Lola Fotheringham and LaGrande Robb. He has four other siblings, Eugene, Farrell, Patricia and DeAnna. He grew up on a farm in Paragoonah where he helped his Grandfather manage a large amount of property. Many of his childhood summers were spent plowing down sage brush for more farmland, moving cattle, harvesting the crops and taking care of other farm duties. At the age of 11, he started plowing ground for his grandfather and over the next few years plowed about 1,400 acres of land. He also raised an award-winning calf that won him a trip to Columbia, MO. Cliff left Paragoonah to go to School at Utah State University for an agricultural degree and then transferred to the University of Utah. It was good that he made the change, because it was during this time, that he met Karilin.

Karilin Fuller was born in Hayward, California April 18, 1937 to Mini Roundy and Francis Marvin Fuller. She has four other siblings, Frank, Max, Camille, and Greg. She lived most of her youth in various parts of California. Her father had a machine shop and her mother was a Rosie Riveter during the war. In her teenage years her family moved to Richfield Utah to be closer to relatives. While in Richfield she worked at a soda shop as a soda jerk at Mark's Ice Cream. Karilin's family moved to Salt Lake City where she started a job at the Salt Lake Police department. Karilin always wanted to be a physician but choose to be a mother instead. Although she never able to go to school to be a physician, she was a great Dr. Mom.

Cliff and Karilin have 6 Children: Kelly (deceased), Jeff, Kristin, Shawn, Nathan (deceased) and David. They also have 15 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. They also helped with the Indian Placement Program and had several foster children from it with which they still have some contact.

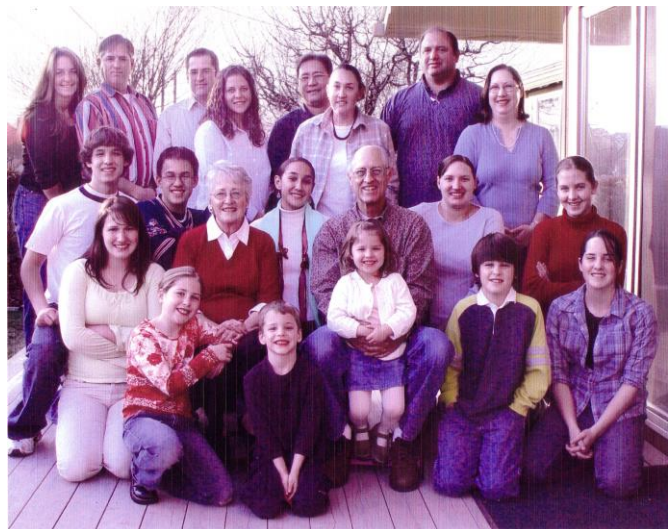
Shortly after getting married Cliff received an offer to work in Salmon Idaho for Garrett Freight lines.

He worked in the trucking industry as a driver, branch manager, and safety manager the rest of his life. Cliff's experience on the farm helped him learn how to fix or build just about anything. Cliff even built his own storage shed while in his late 70's out of scrap wood from his Son's house. After being in Salmon for a few years with the bears, and frosty inside walls during the winter, they decided to leave the frozen life and move back to Utah and have lived here ever since. Karilin has been a homemaker for much of her life. However, she and Cliff did own a fabric and sewing store for a while. She knew how to sew well and was always making clothes for the kids. At times Cliff even helped with sewing and one time even finished off some dresses for the girls. They were both great with money and always knew how to stretch a dollar. Karilin did a lot of work with Title IV - Higher Education Act and the Indian Placement Program. Education was very important to her and she loved to learn about everything. Especially studying the Book of Mormon and other religious learning.

After retirement Cliff was recruited to teach truck driving at the MATC in Orem where he taught hundreds of people how to drive truck until he decided to officially retire for good. During that time Karilin was able to watch after their grandchildren and have many "Grandma Days." The grandchildren all loved grandma days because they got to hear stories, make craft and treats and have great adventures. Out of these fun grandma days Karilin created a book for the grand kids detailing the funny things they said and did.

Both have been active members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Their membership and service in the church has been one of their most prize possession in life. They served a mission in the BYU Family History Library for many years and love doing their family history.

Karilin was diagnosed with Alzheimer's in 2010 and Cliff had lovingly taken care of her until he had a stroke in April of 2018. Karilin moved into Summerfield June of 2018 and Cliff in July. They are very grateful to still be able to live together at Summerfield.
